
#### Dear Families,



## Yarmer Reception / Year One

What a busy and exciting week we've had in Yarmer!

In Reception, the children have been learning all about the numbers 1 and 2 – exploring what they look like, how to represent them, and what they mean. They have also done brilliantly taking part in their Baseline activities – we are so proud of how well they've approached these!

In Year 1, the focus in maths has been on finding one less, comparing groups by matching, and using key vocabulary such as *greater than, less than, equal to, fewer, more,* and *same*.

In art, we've been mixing paints to create the beautiful colours inspired by the work of Yvonne Coomber, while in geography, the children used different resources to create their very own aerial view of Thurlestone

— fantastic creativity and teamwork on display!

Science has been full of exploration and discovery. We carried out experiments where the children smelled different foods, guessed what they might be, and ranked them from strongest to weakest. We also went on a sound walk around the school, carefully listening to and identifying different sounds in our environment.

A special highlight this week was our welcome service at the church, where the children were officially welcomed into our school community by teachers, parents, and friends. Reception children were especially excited to meet their Year 6 buddies — and even enjoyed a little treat together!

As writers, we are coming to the end of our 'Bike Boy' unit of work, where we have been focussing on similes and the use of sense to improve our writing along with adverbial phrase. We will now be planning and writing our own descriptive narrative based on the Bike Boy text, using all the skills learnt over the past few weeks.

As mathematicians this week, we have come to the end of our Place Value unit.. The children have been learning how to round numbers up to 10,000 (Year 4) and 1,000,000 (Year 5) and understand 1,10,100,1000 and 10,000 more or less than a given number. We will be moving on to addition and subtraction using inverse operations and multi-step word problems next week.

In History, the children have learnt about why the Romans wanted an empire and why Britannia was an important island to control. In ICT, they have been learning about input and outputs and I was particularly impressed with their 'shadow drama piece' they produced in music.
